Our team comes from different parts of the world to help children with congenital heart defects. As the Covid-19 pandemic brought global travel to a virtual halt, we had to postpone several planned deployments during 2020 and 2021.

Alhamdulillah, with a successful rollout of the global vaccine programme and regular activities resuming to some sanity, we are doubling our efforts to help more children this year. Serving humanity – is at the core of what we do.

Earlier in the summer, with the grace of Allah and your unwavering support, we managed to take our Little Hearts missions to Egypt and Kenya respectively where we helped at least 80 children suffering from various types of congenital heart d efects. As we start arranging this report, our team plans to travel to three more countries this autumn to help hundreds of children suffering from this crippling but treatable condition.

This booklet is an acknowledgement to our donors, volunteers, supporters, colleagues, our international team, and the children we were able to support. The verses constantly resonates with our work as Allah says: ..And whoever saves the life of a person is as if he has saved the life of the whole of humankind.. (Surah Maidah, verse 32)

IT WAS WORTH ALL THE TROUBLE!

I have been a part of the Little Hearts team for eight years now.

From arranging the team of international doctors and other medical professionals to dealing with various state bureaucracies to shipping equipment, delivering Little Hearts missions under normal circumstances can be very challenging. But, the tests the Covid-19 pandemic presented came from a different level altogether.

For starters, it made everything unpredictable. It added new layers of bureaucracy both in the UK and internationally to our already complex scheduling systems.

As the Covid-19 pandemic started to spread in early 2020, we had to postpone missions due to various national lockdowns and travel restrictions imposed internationally. Lack of vaccination against this deadly virus meant it was unsafe to travel with a team during the summer as the virus continued to spread and mutate.

With the successful rollout of the Covid-19 vaccination programme earlier this year, the international travel looked promising, but with it came a plethora of complexities of traffic light system vaccine certifications and quarantine rules.

Our Little Hearts team is diverse. During the early stages of our mission to Egypt, we tried to manoeuvre through quarantine rules of four different countries, including Egypt, where national lockdown varied from region to region.



Mission to Kenya threw a different set of challenges altogether. It was a red list country for the people travelling from the United Kingdom and the European Union. That meant a hotel quarantine for our team upon arrival in Kenya and another quarantine when they returned to their respective home countries.

A Little Hearts mission typically takes 7-10 days to complete, but these quarantine rules would have stretched the donation of each mission to a minimum three-week. With the tight schedule of our volunteer medical team, it was impossible to go ahead on that time scale. However, after a series of conversations with the Kenyan authorities, our team was granted exemption from these self-isolation rules.

When we look back, at one point, it almost looked impossible to deliver these missions, but our desire to reach these children and the support we received from our donors during these challenging times kept us going. In the end, we were able to help over 80 children who were waiting for these interventions for over a year now.



Given an option, we would have preferred less hassle, but was it worth all the trouble? Without a shadow of a doubt, the answer is yes.

The following pages are a testament of our shared desire to help these children and secure their future.
